

Thanks to all the parents who have donated their time during the past couple months to help put on all these events and fundraisers. The time you put in truly does make a positive impact on the students.


BUILDING READERS

Teach your child to tackle tough words

Sometimes words are hard to figure out, and that's why schools teach "word attack" skills. When your child approaches a challenging word, she can:

- Sound out the word, making and blending letter sounds. Which sounds make the most sense?
- Think of similar words. What words look like the mystery word? For example, freight looks and sounds like eight.
- Look carefully at pictures. What people, things and actions are shown? Do they provide any clues?
- **Read more.** Reread the sentence—and the ones before and after it. Think about what words might fit. Give them a try!

How Families Can Help Children Become Better Readers

Title I Cooperative Educational Service Unit 10

Put some extra thought into reading time

During your family's reading time each day, it's important to have "thinking time," too. This builds your child's comprehension. For example:

Before reading a book, talk about it.
 Why does it look interesting? What is it about? What hints does the cover provide? Encourage your child to ask questions and make comments while you read.

Think aloud while reading. You and your child might wonder, "Why did that happen?" "Does the story make sense?" "What could happen next?" "Do you agree with that character's decision?"

• After reading a book, talk about it again. Did you like it? Why or why not? Do you relate to the characters' experiences or feelings? Discuss it again days later, when your child has had more time to think about the story.

'Journaling' is an exciting writing project

Keeping a journal is a great way to build reading and writing skills. But kids aren't always enthusiastic about "journaling." Try giving your child a notebook, a pen and irresistible ideas, such as:

- Rewriting a favorite story. Encourage your child to write something new about a character he loves.
- Writing a silly poem. Don't follow the "rules." Instead, craft a poem that uses fun combinations of words!
- Trading messages. Pass notes with your child. Write a fun question in his notebook for him to answer. Then he can write back and ask you something.
- Writing for TV. Suggest that your child imagine a new episode of a TV show he loves. Read—and compliment the story he writes!


Let reading inspire family activities

Add sight words to your child's regular learning routine


Children are often told to "sound out" words. But that's especially difficult with some words. Introduce



your child to sight words—words she needs to recognize quickly. Ask her teacher for a list. Then make flash cards that use words and pictures. (The

number "twelve" might have a "12" next to it, for example.) Use the cards to review often.

- IMPORTANT NOTICE FROM THE UNIVERSITY OF NEBRASKA AT LINCOLN!!! UNL will no longer accept ACT or SAT scores sent from high schools starting with students entering in the summer or fall of 2011. These test scores MUST be sent to UNL DIRECTLY from the testing agency! Any student interested in attending UNL should make sure they choose UNL's code when registering for these tests. The scores will be sent to UNL for free. If any parent or student has any questions about this policy, please ask Mrs. Luther.
- SENIORS: Have you checked out Overton's website? Click on the "College Information" link. JUNIORS—it's never too early to look at this yourself! Another site available is SchoolSoup.com. It is supposed to be the largest scholarship database in the world. We have added this link to our website, as well.
- SENIORS: If you think you might do your FAFSA online, you need to register for a PIN.

 Dependent students must have their parents register. This may be done at

 www.pin.ed.gov. FAFSA is the form that allows you to receive college grants and loans
 from the government. You will not fill out the form until after the first of the year,
 but you can apply for your PIN anytime.
- POTENTIAL COLLEGE ATHLETES: register with the NCAA clearinghouse! Come see me if you have any questions. ACT scores must be sent to the clearinghouse via ACT, not our school. PLEASE NOTE!!! The NCAA is changing eligibility rules beginning with this year's senior and freshmen classes. Division II schools have increased the number of core classes from 14 to 16, a rule that starts with this year's senior class. Division I has increased its minimum core class GPA from 2.0 to 2.3. They will also require that 10 of the 16 core course requirements be finished before the beginning of the student's 7th semester, or at the beginning of their senior year. This will impact this year's freshmen students.
- The NAIA has started a registration process for potential athletes, much like the NCAA. If you have a student interested in playing for one of these colleges, check out their website at www.playnaia.org.
- The next ACT TESTING DATE is April 13th. Registration for that test is due March 8th. ACT tests will be given in Overton in April and June. Students who qualify for free or reduced lunch prices may be able to receive a fee waiver from ACT. Remember you now MUST upload a picture to your application!!!! See Mrs. Luther for more information.
- ACT reports that 70% of all test-takers now register online. They are encouraging as many students as possible to sign up in this manner. Information is in Mrs. Luther's office; or you may go to act.org for details or to set up a free account.
- The UNIVERSITY OF NEBRASKA AT LINCOLN'S COLLEGE OF ARCHITECTURE will again sponsor summer workshop for high school students in 10th-12th grades. The workshop will be on the UNL campus from June 9th to June 15th. Students interested in Architecture, Interior Design, or Landscape Architecture are encouraged to apply before April 5th. The fee is \$585 and includes meals, lodging, and supplies. See Mrs. Luther for an application!!!
- CASPER (WY) COLLEGE is hosting a Fire Science workshop on March 16th at the campus. If you would like to find out more about a firefighting career, see Mrs. Luther for more info.

- BRYAN COLLEGE OF HEALTH SCIENCES in Lincoln will be hosting a HEALTH CAREER CAMP this summer for high school students to learn more about the medical field. The camp will be held either July 8-12 or July 22-26. See Mrs. Luther if you are interested.

If a student is eligible for a Pell Grant through the FAFSA process, they may be able to receive a full tuition grant. Students and parents must complete the FAFSA process by April 1st to be eligible. See Mrs. Luther with any questions!!

- * The SUSAN THOMPSON BUFET FOUNDATION will begin accepting applications for their scholarships on January 1st. It is best to start planning for this application NOW!!! This very generous scholarship (last year estimated at being worth over \$55,000) must be completed by March 1st (although some documents may be uploaded to the application site through March 15th). The scholarship may be used at any of the University of Nebraska campuses or at any state or community college campus. Applicants must have at least an 80% overall high school GPA and be a graduating senior from a Nebraska high school. FAFSA applications MUST be completed and returned to complete this scholarship application. Please start planning early, as this requires tax information to be complete!!! Families with a combined income of up to \$95,000 may satisfy the financial need criterion. Please consider applying for this scholarship!!!! See Mrs. Luther for further details!!!!! Information and the application may be found at www.buffettscholarships.org.
- * The Central Platte Natural Resources District is again offering 10 \$1000 scholarships for students planning to major in a variety of agricultural or environmental careers. The application may be found at www.cpnrd.org or in Mrs. Luther's office. The deadline is March 15th.
- * CENTRAL COMMUNITY COLLEGE offers a variety of scholarships for incoming freshmen. Their general scholarship application may be found at www.cccneb.edu/financialaid and is due March 1st.
