Greetings, Overton families! My name is Mr. Chase Christensen and I am pleased to serve the community as the school's new 5-12 Instrumental Music Director and Technology Director. I spent all summer preparing to fill these roles and I worked closely with Mr. Brumm to ensure the transition was smooth. Allow me to update you on what my classes have planned for this school year!

High School Band:

I'm grateful to our high schoolers for the amount of work they've put in so far this year (and for the amount of patience they have with me!). After spending the first few weeks getting to know each other and preparing music for our football and volleyball home openers, we are now getting ready for marching band! The Overton Eagles Marching Band will perform at three parades this year (all consecutive Saturdays):

Tips Families Can Use to Help Children Do Better in School

For a successful parent-teacher conference, do your homework

Your attendance at a parent-teacher conference can make a big difference to your child's success in school, especially if you take some time to prepare. For the best outcome:

- **Set up an appointment.** If the available conference times don't work for you, contact the teacher to ask about alternatives.
- **Ask the school office** about getting an interpreter if you aren't comfortable speaking English.
- **Ask your child** about her experience in the classroom so far. What is going well? Is she concerned about anything? Let your child know you look forward to working with the teacher.
- **Write down your questions.** You may want to ask about your child's work habits, or how she gets along with the other students. Write down anything you want to tell the teacher about your child, too.
- **Listen attentively during the conference.** Keep an open mind as the teacher expresses her views, which may be different from yours. Ask about what to expect and how you can help, and share the teacher's ideas with your child.
- **Stay in touch** with the teacher throughout the year to see how your child is doing. Always let the teacher know if concerns arise.



Don't let failures sidetrack your child

No child succeeds at everything all the time. When failures or setbacks occur, help your child deal with them in positive ways. Here are some strategies:

- **Let your child know** you will always love him for who he is.
- **View mistakes** as learning experiences. Help him think of what he can do differently. If he "forgot" he had homework, talk about strategies to help him remember.
- **Help him see** the plus side. "Your soccer team lost, but you made a great assist for that goal in the second half."
- **Don't ask teachers** or coaches to change a grade or a call. Your child must learn to respect their decisions.
- **Be a role model.** Handle your own mistakes in positive ways. Never call yourself "stupid."
- **Be realistic.** If your child is doing his best but his grade is still low, don't show your disappointment. Contact his teacher to discuss other solutions to try.

Perseverance is worth it

Kids today are used to instant gratification. But most school skills take time to develop. Teach your child the word *perseverance*. Continued effort over time may not be easy. But sticking with a task and trying different solutions is the best way for students to learn and overcome obstacles.

Promote math and science

Studies show that belief in the myth that "girls aren't good at math and science" affects students as early as in kindergarten.



But research says that engaging girls and boys in the same exciting math and science activities gives them equal confidence in their abilities. To encourage your child to see herself as someone who is good in math and science:

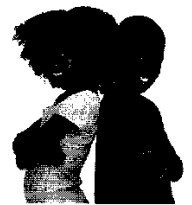
- **Explore technology.** Look for apps that let your child try coding. For ideas, visit www.common SenseMedia.org/lists/coding-apps-and-websites.
- **Play math games.** In the car, have your child add numbers on license plates.
- **Challenge her to design** an invention that will make your family's lives easier at home.

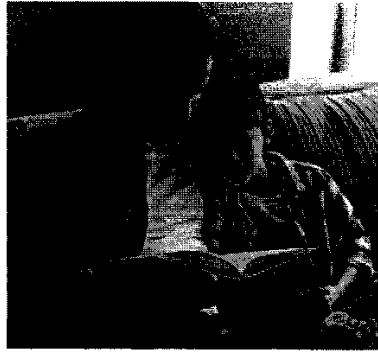

Q&A How can I help my child want to read and learn?

Q: My second grader is always negative about school. I'm especially worried because he doesn't like to read. What can I do to help him see how important reading and learning are?

A: It's not unusual for kids to feel unmotivated about subjects they don't love. But there are things you can do to turn your son's attitude around:

- **Start a conversation.** Talk with your son about why you value education. Tell him he will use reading to learn all kinds of different subjects. You can also ask him about jobs he might like to do someday. Then help him see how doing well in school can help him achieve his dreams.
- **Set up a contract.** Establish a regular reading time and set limits on screen time. Then, consider awarding your child one point for every day he does his reading without a fuss. Once he gets a certain number of points in a row (at least two weeks' worth), he earns a small reward.
- **Give him enticing things to read.** What does he love? There are bound to be books and websites about it. Ask the librarian for ideas. You might also encourage your child to write his own article on the subject.
- **Praise his efforts.** "You hit an unfamiliar word and kept on reading. And you figured the word out from what was around it. Great strategy!"

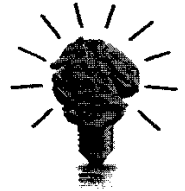

Everyone's help is wanted

Family involvement in education takes many forms. It can be as simple as asking your child to tell you about something he figured out in class today. It can involve volunteering at school, or working with other parents. All primary caregivers—mothers, fathers, grandparents and others—have valuable contributions to make. For ideas on how to get involved, ask your child's teacher.

Talking can help kids write

Elementary schoolers are often asked to write about personal experiences. But many children struggle when faced with a blank sheet of paper. To help your child get over a case of writer's block:



- **Have him tell you** about the experience he is going to write about.
- **Ask questions** to help him focus on the points he wants to make and the order they should come in. Why were he and his dad building a shelf? Did they read the directions before or after they began?

Make rules unforgettable

When kids are used to following rules at home, they follow them at school—and that makes learning easier. To make your house rules memorable, see if you and your child can dream up a catchy phrase that sums up each rule and its consequence. For example:

- **If you hit, you sit.** Any physical action toward someone results in a time out.
- **If you partake, you take part.** Everyone contributes at mealtime—by cooking, wiping the table, etc.
- **Pick up or pay up.** Belongings left out of place get put in time out. Your child can redeem them for a small "fee."

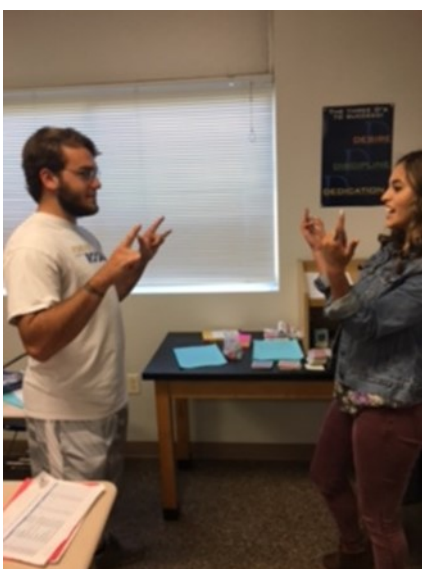
Mrs. Bowie's Math Classroom

This year in math I have made it a goal to incorporate more problem-solving into the day to day curriculum. Not just in the standard way of working through a word problem, but in some creative ways. One of the activities that we did was called Counting to 30 in which the class had to try to count to 30 without making gestures or talking. The students were first asked to do this with no



guidance or plan. After a few tries of not succeeding they had to come up with plans in their groups on possible ways they could get it to work without gestures or talking. The students figured out some creative ways and found that it is difficult to do tasks without communication. The students had a blast doing this activity and hopefully will continue to have this enthusiasm as we do more throughout the year.

Another activity that we did at the beginning of the year was a finger draw with students' basic math skills. The students had to have a partner and turn around with their fingers drawn and do whatever operation I told them. Sometimes they had to multiply, add, subtract, divide, square root or any combination of the operations. Students found that doing math facts quickly could be difficult and it was easy to make errors. This was a great activity for all grades to participate and was made more difficult as the classes got more advanced in their mathematical knowledge.



In math this year our goal is to make math more fun and incorporate more activities to get students hands on experience with a math topic. Class will hopefully continue to be enjoyable for students, but also demanding in requiring them to take their learning one step further. Math is a subject that has so many applications and I really want the students to experience some of those applications this year with problem-solving activities and other hands on experiences.



Celebrating Nebraska Thursdays in the School Cafeteria!

-ACT Test

Take the ACT test. You must take the test by December. Have your scores sent directly to the college(s) you are considering attending. College codes can be found on the ACT website, or I can help you find them. I have the registration forms available, or you can register at <http://www.actstudent.org>

-EducationQuest.org

Register with EducationQuest! They will provide you with information and help you prepare for scholarships, applications to college, and financial aid. The Activities Resume, College Profile, and ScholarshipQuest will be just a few of the useful resources. This is also where you will find out more information about College Fairs you can attend.

-APPLY

Apply to the top three colleges you are considering attending.
Go to the Admissions page of the college of your choice, you will find all of the information you need.

-COLLEGE VISITS & Representatives

College Visits or meeting with Representatives are a great way to learn more about many colleges. You also have the opportunity to have your questions answered directly by a representative from that college. Please plan to visit colleges you are interested with your parents.

-LETTERS of RECOMMENDATION:

Begin asking for letters of recommendation. Make sure you are asking a person who can write you a positive letter, and make sure to give them plenty of time to write you a quality letter.

-SCHOLARSHIPS:

Always check on the website of the college you plan to attend for scholarship information. I will provide Scholarship information as I receive it. Please use the links I have provide on my website as well as looking on the website of the college you plan to attend.

-FINANCIAL AID:

The next most important, (maybe even the most important) step is planning and preparing to have your income taxes ready to apply for your FAFSA. Your child's financial aid and some scholarships will be determined based on completion of the *FAFSA (Free Application for Federal Student Aid)* form which requires a completed income tax return.

EducationQuest will be offering webinars where families will be able to participate in a presentation to learn about financial aid and an overview of the FAFSA. Our scheduled time is October 4th in the Spanish Room. The start times will be 7:00 pm.

October's Topic: Social Media Not So Social for Teens

According to a new study from the Pew Research Center, 24% of teenagers (ages 13–17) are online “almost constantly.” The intense way in which young people are connected is enabled largely by the use of smartphones. Nearly 75% of teens have access to a smartphone and 30% have a basic phone. These phones and other mobile devices have become a primary driver of teen internet use: 91% of teens go online from mobile devices at least occasionally.

For the current generation of teens, gaming, video chatting, text messaging and social networking are a vital means of self-expression and a central aspect of their social lives. The digital age has changed—both positively and negatively—the way teenage friendships are formed and maintained.

The research also found the following:

- For today’s teens, friendships may start digitally.
- Text messaging is a key component of young people’s daily interactions.
- Video games play an important role in the development and maintenance of boys’ friendships and online gaming builds stronger connections between friends.
- Teen friendships are both strengthened and challenged by social media.
- Phone calls are less common early in a friendship, but are an important way that teens talk with their closest friends.

Age: 11 and up

Questions to Start the Conversation

- Does this information reflect your own experiences or the experiences of your friends? Why or why not?
- In what ways is being connected “almost constantly” both positive and negative?
- What do you think life was like for teens before technology?
- Do you say and share things using technology (social media, texting, etc.) that you would not share in person? How so?
- Is there anything about your technology habits you would like to change and if so, what would that be?

Questions to Dig Deeper

(See the More Information section for articles and information that address these questions.)

- What do you see happening in the future with technology and social media?
- I know parents often worry about their teens being “addicted” to technology or young people losing their social skills because of all the technology. What’s your take on these concerns?
- Do you ever see “cyberhate” online? What do you think can be done about it?

Ideas for Taking Action

Ask: What can we do to help? What actions might make a difference?

- Using the Pew research questions and others of your own, create a survey about teens and technology and distribute it to classmates and friends. Compile and share the results.
- Working with other students and school staff, develop a public awareness campaign about cyberbullying and what to do about it.
- As a family, decide on a specified amount of time to go “off the grid” (i.e. not use technology) in order to gain insights into what is gained and lost by being connected. Share your reflections through a letter or essay on the topic.

HIGHLIGHTS

- Find out what children know and use the summary to expand their knowledge. Ask what else they want to know and investigate together to learn more.
- When discussing the topic, ask children open ended questions that deepen the conversation. Do not judge their responses and listen thoughtfully.
- Think together about a child-level action they can take; this can be something they do on their own or something you do together or as a family.
