Weather Reminders:

Business Department,

Students are hard at work in the business classes as the year is off to a fast start. Here is a rundown of all of the classes and what we are doing in each class.

1st period-

Yearbook is going really well as I have 3 students from last year and 6 new students and I have a senior editor in Lexi Reil who has really taken off with being a very good leader and following the vision and mission of the yearbook. Junior Cheyenne White has started off well with following expectation of Mr. Gilson and the yearbook class. I am very impressed with how they are leading the class to help support and create a hardworking mindset in the classroom to make sure all pages are being completed on time and tasks and duties are being performed on a daily basis. We have officially started our Yearbook Sales for the new year and we will be selling them at 25 dollars without a name and 32 dollars with a name. This is a very special year, because when Mr. Gilson came here, the yearbook was being sold at 33 dollars and 36 dollars with a name and he set a goal for his yearbook students to balance the budget every year and still drop the yearbook to 25 dollars by 2025. We are in year 6 of the yearbook and we not only have met our goal of dropping the yearbook for the Overton Community, but we have been ahead of schedule by dropping it to 25 dollars by Year 2020-21. That is a big accomplishment because we have balanced the budget and still been able to lower the yearbook to this price. I am very proud of how we have handled business affairs and produced a yearbook each year better and better. Yearbooks will be on sale until March 5, 2021. Also we still have yearbooks from last year and we are selling those for 20 dollars a piece so please purchase before they are all gone.

2nd period-

Accounting students are doing very well as we are learning how to do accounting records for a sole proprietorship. Currently we are learning about journaling and I have seen very good skills being learned in the classroom.

4th period

Entrepreneurship Class is going very well as students have new curriculum that teaches them how to build a business plan for the upcoming year. The students also have a Virtual Business Simulation program they are using that allows them to learn valuable skills in being an entrepreneur and running through a simulation where they must succeed to be able to move on in the next lesson. The students seem to really enjoy what is taking place in class and I look forward to see what they accomplish in the upcoming year.

5th period

Computer Applications for 7th and 8th grade- 7th grade students are currently using [typing.com](https://www.typing.com) to learn to use the keyboard on a computer and then in the 8th grade they will start on Microsoft Office Skills so they will be ready for Information Technology in the 9th grade. These students have been very disciplined and structured and have breezed through the work as their behavior has been great!

6th period

Personal Finance students are working with CTE Curriculum that is based out of California and follows Nebraska Standards. Also we are working with Dave Ramsey's "Baby Steps" System to help give them the foundational skills to live in today's financial world. We are also going through a Personal Finance Business Simulation and they must meet all of the requirements to move along in the simulation. The students are doing very well so far.

7th period

Information Technology is going very well as students are working on Microsoft Office skills and then we were able to begin a new program called "Edhesive" and this program is based out of Georgia Tech University where they developed the curriculum and along with Amazon funding and working with this program it allows our students to use this curriculum and technology to be able to work with coding and Earsketch a website where students code and make music and work with Amazon in possibly developing future engineers.

8th period

Marketing students are working with CTE curriculum based out of California that follows Nebraska Standards and is a great curriculum that teaches students how to be marketing students in the Marketing World. We are also working with Virtual Business Simulation and students are running simulation program that allows them to learn about the Management and Marketing of a Hotel. Students must master each simulation while learning new content and pass the material to be able to move on in the simulation.

Throughout the day, members were engaged virtually and were still able to gain valuable information and new ideas!



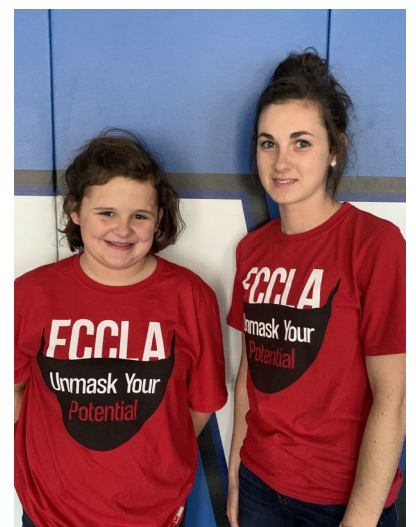
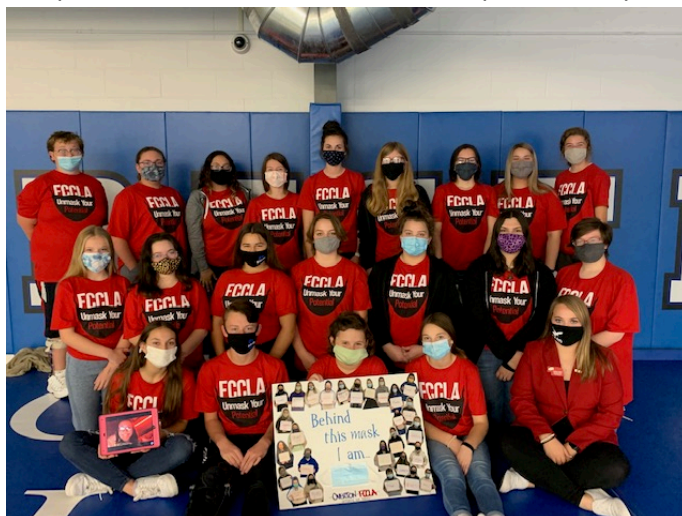
District Leadership Conference

Middle School Social Science

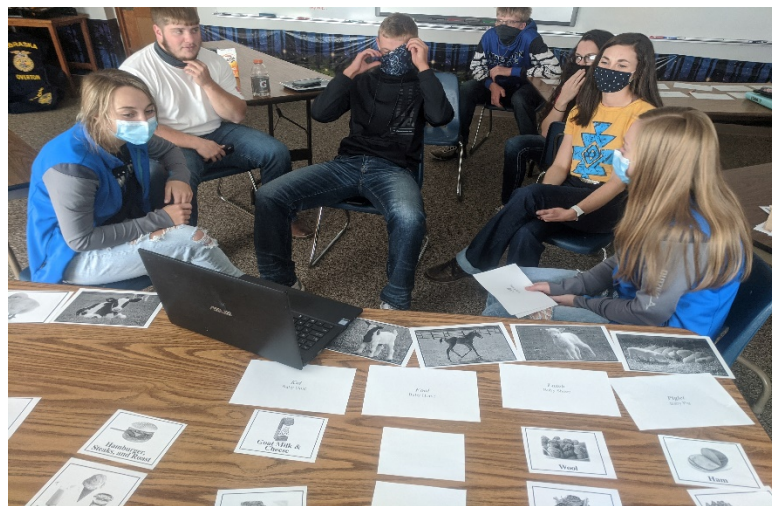
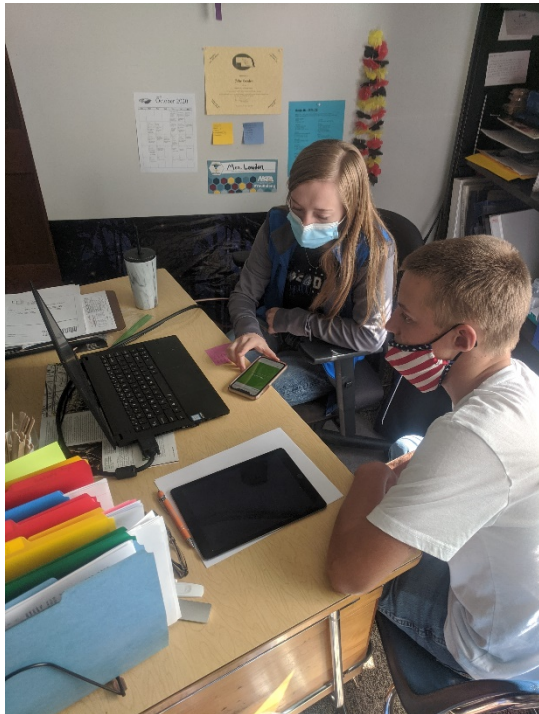
The school year is off to a flying start. The middle school social science classes are busy learning about our nation's history, our world's history, and one group is learning about the indigenous people of our great nation. The 5th grade class has spent much of this first quarter of school focusing on the different Native groups that have and, in many cases still do inhabit both North and South America. They learned about dwellings that these groups lived in, and while studying the Eastern Woodland natives they wanted a chance to try their hand at building their own Longhouse or Wigwam. These are the traditional dwellings of the Iroquois and the Algonquians. They took the time to research each group and then drew blueprints of either a Longhouse or Wigwam. Once they were done with that, they built a model. Below are some examples of their creativity. They then presented their models to the class. While doing this project they showed an amazing job of teamwork and cooperation.



Overton, Neb. - The Overton FFA chapter participated in the Connecting Chapters training on September 29th. The chapter wanted to prepare for an agricultural literacy project. Courtney Shreve of the Nebraska Farm Bureau Foundation led the training.

Addison Luther, Parker Walahoski, and the eighth period agronomy class all participated in the training. They learned new activities to teach to elementary students, they learned how to read a book to elementary students, and they learned how to teach a lesson on baby farm animals.

This is the third year that Overton has participated in the Connecting Chapters program hosted by the Nebraska Farm Bureau. Nebraska Farm Bureau is a sponsor for the Nebraska FFA Association.





Reducing the Risk of Choking in Young Children at Mealtimes

Children **under the age of 4** are at a high risk of choking while eating. Young children are still learning how to chew food properly, and they often swallow the food whole. Their small airways can become easily blocked.

You can help reduce children's risk of choking when eating by preparing food in certain ways, such as cutting food into small pieces and cooking hard food, like carrots, until it is soft enough to pierce with a fork. **Remember, always supervise children during meals and snacks.**



Prepare Foods So They Are Easy to Chew

You can make eating safer for young children by following the tips below:

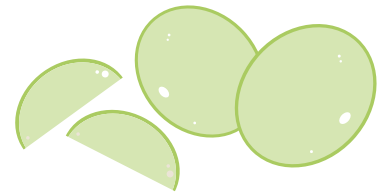
- Cook or steam hard food, like carrots, until it is soft enough to pierce with a fork.
- Remove seeds, pits, and tough skins/peels from fruits and vegetables.
- Finely chop foods into thin slices, strips, or small pieces (no larger than ½ inch), or grate, mash, or puree foods. This is especially important when serving raw fruits and vegetables, as those items may be harder to chew.
- Remove all bones from fish, chicken, and meat before cooking or serving.
- Grind up tough meats and poultry.

Cut Round Foods Into Smaller Pieces

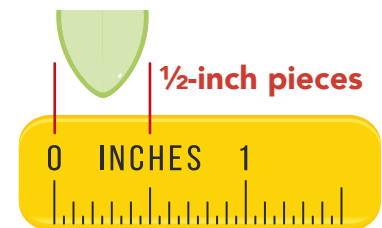
Small round foods such as grapes, cherries, cherry tomatoes, and melon balls are common causes of choking.



Slice these items in half lengthwise.



Then slice into smaller pieces (**no larger than ½ inch**) when serving them to young children.



Avoid Choking Hazards

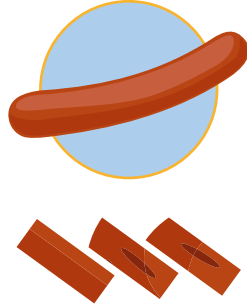
To help prevent choking, do not serve small (marble-sized), sticky, or hard foods that are difficult to chew and easy to swallow whole, including:

- Cheese cubes or blocks. Grate or thinly slice cheese before serving.
- Chewing gum*
- Dried fruit
- Gummy fruit snacks*
- Hard candy, including caramels, cough drops, jelly beans, lollipops, etc.*
- Hard pretzels and pretzel chips
- Ice cubes*
- Marshmallows*
- Nuts and seeds, including breads, crackers, and cereals that contain nuts and seeds
- Popcorn
- Spoonfuls of peanut butter or other nut butters. Spread nut butters thinly on other foods (e.g., toast, crackers, etc.). Serve only creamy, not chunky, nut butters.
- Whole round or tube-shaped foods such as grapes, cherry tomatoes, cherries, raw carrots, sausages, and hot dogs

Cut Tube-shaped Foods Into Smaller Pieces

Cut tube-shaped foods, such as baby carrots, string cheese, hot dogs, etc., into short strips rather than round pieces.



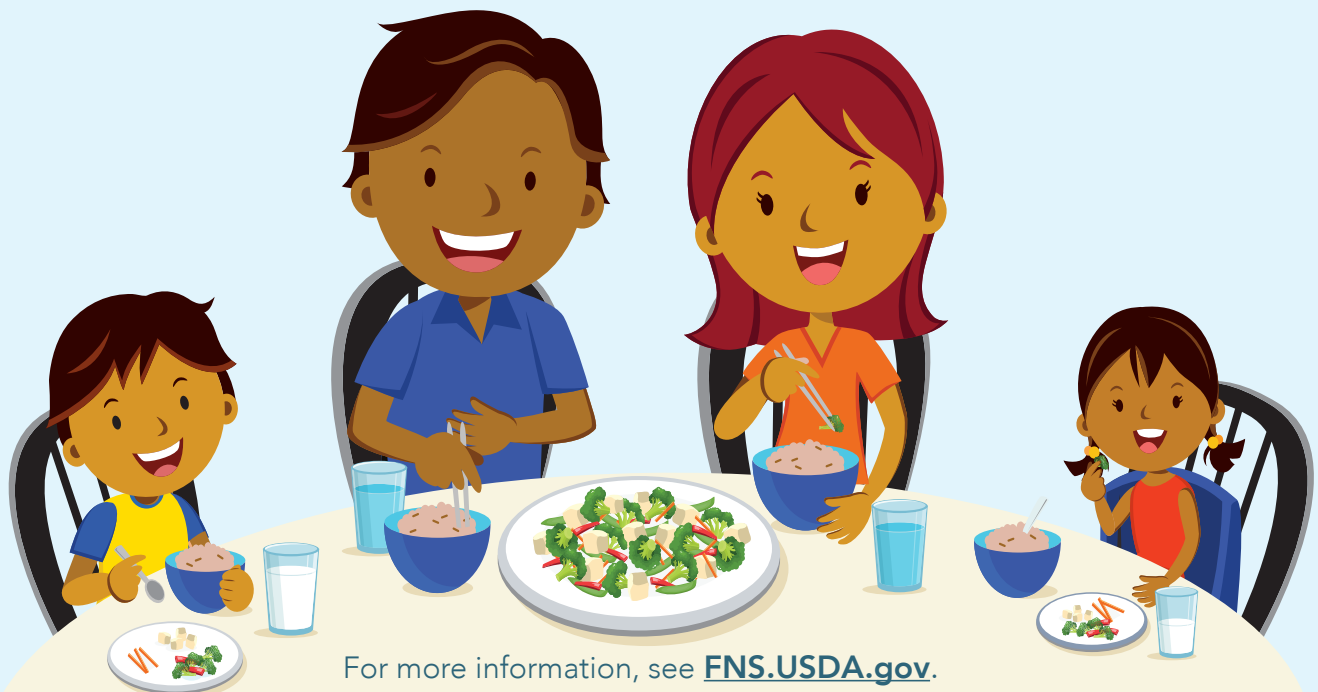
In addition to the foods listed, **avoid serving foods that are as wide around as a nickel**, which is about the size of a young child's throat.



Teach Good Eating Habits

Sit and eat with children at meals and snacks. Remind children to take small bites of food and swallow between bites. Eating together may help you quickly spot a child who might be choking. Other tips to help prevent choking while eating include:

- Only providing foods as part of meals and snacks served at a dining table or high chair. When serving infants, do not prop the bottle up on a pillow or other item for the baby to feed him or herself.
- Allowing plenty of time for meals and snacks.
- Making sure children are sitting upright while eating.
- Reminding children to swallow their food before talking or laughing.
- Modeling safe behavior for children to follow, including eating slowly, taking small bites, and chewing food completely before swallowing.
- Encouraging older children to serve as role models for younger children as well. All children should avoid playing games with food, as that may lead to an increased risk of choking.

Try It Out!

How can you prepare and serve the following foods to reduce the risk of choking?

1 Whole baby carrots

2 Whole grapes

3 Peanut butter

4 Block of cheddar cheese

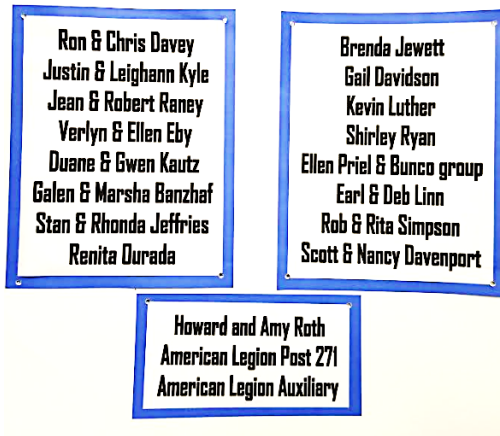
1. Cut carrots lengthwise into thin strips (not circles). You could also cook carrots until soft, or cut into small pieces no larger than $\frac{1}{2}$ inch.
2. Cut grapes in half lengthwise, then cut into smaller pieces no larger than $\frac{1}{2}$ inch.
3. Spread peanut butter thinly on small pieces of toast, crackers, etc. Do not serve spoonfuls of peanut butter.
4. Grate or thinly slice the cheese. Do not serve cheese cubes.
